## **Exhibition Tips**

The *Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards (OJES) for Floral Design and Horticulture*, 2019 edition, is the recommended reference guide for exhibiting in Ontario. Copies may be obtained by ordering online at **gardenontario.org**. Another excellent guide is *The Encyclopedia of Judging and Exhibiting Floriculture and Flora-Artistry* by Esther Veramae Hamel (available in the Society's library).

## Always follow the show schedule and rules, and name specimens whenever possible.

Ensure the correct number (and colour) of specimens (or blooms) is exhibited. A bud showing colour is counted as a bloom, so consider this when the class specifies a particular number.

Conditioning and hardening help plants absorb water after cutting, and preserve freshness of specimens longer.

- Cut stems cleanly on a slant using a sharp, clean knife or shears; best times are early morning or late evening; cut more blooms than required.
- Remove leaves from lower half of stems; upper foliage must be attached unless otherwise stated. Place immediately in warm water.
- Some plants do not absorb water as freely as others, and require further treatment prior to hardening, including chrysanthemums, lilies, narcissus, peonies, poppies and tulips. (See pages 43A-43D of *The Encyclopedia of Judging* and Exhibiting for information on specific plants.)
- To harden, place cut flowers and foliage in deep warm water immediately after conditioning in a cool, dark, humid, draft-free area for 4 to 6 hours (or overnight).

## Flower Show Rules

## Judging is based on *Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards (OJES)*for Floral Design and Horticulture, 2019 edition.

- Competitions are open to amateur horticulturists: those who grow plants for pleasure only.
- 2. Exhibitors must be members of the Cannington Horticultural Society.

  Membership may be obtained from the Membership Chairperson up to the time of the show. Shows are open to all current members.
- 3. A member assigned an exhibitor's number in previous years will continue to use this number. Members who have not exhibited previously may secure a permanent exhibitor's number from any member of the Flower Show Committee. To speed the work of setting up the flower shows, members are requested to fill out their entry cards completely before arrival at the flower shows, and if possible have the exhibits ready for placement with cards attached on arrival at the show room. Cards may be obtained at the meeting of the Society prior to the show date.
- 4. No competitor may place more than one entry in any given class.
- 5. Entries must be in place by the time stated on the flower show program.
- 6. All specimens must be grown by the exhibitor and must be his/her own bona fide property for at least three months before the show. Potted plants must be established in pots at least one month prior to a show. Houseplants must be exhibited in their growing pots ONLY please avoid the use of decorative containers or jardinières.
- 7. Houseplants winning a first prize in any one show cannot be entered in another show of the same year.
- 8. Saintpaulia (African Violets) must be single crowned except in the case of trailing varieties.
- 9. Where a definite number or quantity of specimens is specified in the show schedule, neither more nor less than that quantity shall be exhibited. A bud showing colour is considered a bloom. Buds likely to show colour should be removed. Specimens (excluding Narcissus classes) must include their OWN

- foliage, attached if possible.
- 10. Members must supply their own containers for exhibits. Clear, uncoloured glass is suggested for specimen classes: e.g., glass pop bottles, clear wine bottles, jars, etc. (labels removed). Must be <u>stable</u>. Exhibits, personal property, baskets, vases, etc., are at the risk of the exhibitor. The Society will not be liable for any loss.
- 11. No flowers in the specimen classes may be supported by ties, wire, etc. Any mechanics used in the decorative classes must not be visible. Fruit and vegetable specimens must be displayed on an appropriately sized plate (china, paper, styrofoam, etc.) unless otherwise stated; large pumpkins and squash excepted.
- 12. All arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor, and flowers may be obtained from any source. No artificial plant material may be used. Accessories are acceptable only when specified; an accessory is an inorganic object used in a subordinate manner to enhance a design of plant material. Organic objects such as fungi, decorative wood, etc., are not considered accessories.
- 13. Diseased, lousy, scaly or otherwise unhealthy plants will be disqualified upon arrival.
- 14. No awards shall be given for classes in which all exhibits are deemed to be of mediocre quality.
- 15. The Show Committee has full charge of staging. The exhibitor or any Show Committee member may place specimens. The exhibitor may not move another entry to provide a place for his/her own. Design classes are placed only by exhibitor or by permission of such.
- 16. Only persons designated by the Show Committee will be permitted to be in the show area while entries are being judged. The decisions of the judge (or judges) are final.

## ONTARIO HORTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION What Judges Look For: Design Division

The principles of design are basic standards used to organize, define and evaluate the design, its elements and components.

#### **The Principles of Design**

**Balance** is the visual stability from any angle or any dimension. A balanced design does not appear top-heavy, bottom-heavy or lopsided.

**Rhythm** is the visual path that suggests motion in the design accomplished by the repetition of an element at regular or irregular intervals. This can be expressed in line, form, colour, spacing between flowers or the simple repeating of curves or planes within a composition.

**Proportion** is the relative amount of one area to another: e.g., the amount of plant material to the container, the amount of round forms to linear forms, the amount of rough texture to smooth.

**Scale** is the size relationship of all components: e.g., the size of one flower in relation to another, etc.

**Contrast** is difference. Achieved by placing opposite or unlike elements together in such a way as to emphasize difference.

**Dominance** is the force of one element implying subordination.

#### **Horticultural Division Terminology**

**Balance** is the arrangement of the leaves and florets on the stem. The balance should be even and pleasing.

**Colour** should be typical of the cultivar. Variegation should be true for the cultivar.

**Condition** is the actual physical appearance of the entry at the time of judging. Specimens that are over-mature are not of good exhibition quality.

**Distinction** is marked superiority in all respects – it is better, closer to perfection than any other specimen.

**Floriferousness** is abundance of flowers.

**Form** is the overall shape of the plant, flower, leaf and/or stem and should be characteristic of the cultivar.

**Grooming** is the removal of any evidence of spray, dust, insect damage,

foreign materials, or of any faded or wilted petals or leaves.

**Label** should be neat and legible with the correct botanical/common name and cultivar.

**Size** should be normal for a well-grown specimen of the cultivar exhibited. **Stem & Foliage** should be in good proportion to the flower(s). The stem should be sufficiently strong to support the bloom(s). Only attached foliage is permitted unless otherwise stated.

**Substance** quality of firmness of flower or leaf enabling it to retain its characteristic form, freshness and colour.

**Texture** is the surface quality of plant materials, the smoothness or roughness. **Uniformity** When two or more specimens of a given cultivar are shown as one entry, they should be as uniform as possible in size.

#### Specimen Flowering/Fruited/Hanging Flowering/Potted Bulbs

Flowering/fruited plants are grown primarily for the attractiveness and abundance of bloom/fruit. Floriferousness refers to the abundance of bloom/ fruit, which should be of high quality.

#### Floral Emblem: **Common Bleeding Heart** Dicentra spectabilis

There are 19 species of Bleeding Heart native to North America and Asia. The Common Bleeding Heart originally came from Japan, arriving in North America as early as 1810. Hardy from zones 4 to 7. it has become a favourite perennial garden plant. Form is deeply cut blue-green fern-like foliage appearing in mid-to-late spring, when come graceful arching stems holding rose-coloured heart-shaped blooms. There are 2 pairs of flower petals, the outer forming the heart, and the inner forming the "drop of blood", as the heart spurs open to reveal the inner stamens. By mid-summer, the foliage dies back in all but the most favoured shady locations, so it's best to overplant with annuals or plant other perennials nearby to keep colour throughout the season.

The Bleeding Heart is best planted in light shade (morning sun with afternoon shade) with welldrained soil generously supplemented with peat moss or leaf mould. The plant can grow to be 2 to 2 1/2 feet tall, and usually has a long life. Full sun can be tolerated if the soil is moist.

To propagate, sow seeds in cold frames in the fall to flower the following season. Divide the clumps every 3 to 4 years in late winter, when the plant is dormant.

#### Little Bluestem

The Perennial Plant Association's 2022 Perennial Plant of the Year is Schizachvrium scoparium and cultivars. Little bluestem is a tough and dependable clumping grass that blends well with perennials such as asters, sedums, coneflowers, and other grasses.

Native to a broad swath of North America, it was one of the dominant grasses of the vast tallgrass prairies. Cultivars have been selected for shorter plants, enhanced leaf colors and stronger stems.

The wider selection of not only little bluestem, but any associated cultivars, allows regional perennial experts to select and promote the cultivars that do best in their location

# Photographic Competition Rules

- 1. Competition is open to all members of the Cannington Horticultural Society who are not professional photographers.
- 2. Entries are limited to one per person in each class.
- 3. Images must be taken during the previous 24 months and not previously exhibited in our society's competition.
- 4. All images must contain horticultural content.
- 5. Images may be in colour or black-and-white. For judging purposes, no distinction will be made between black and white or colour images.
- 6. Images may be from digital or film sources. For judging purposes, no distinction will be made between images digital and/or film origins.
- 7. No Photoshop or significant retouching allowed. Cropping is allowed.
- 8. Images should be no larger than 4" x 6" and no smaller than 4" x 4". Prints must be mounted on a 5" x 7" piece of board, white in colour. No mats or frames allowed.
- 9. Image for bookmark *must* be vertical/portrait format. For judging purposes a template will be used the exact size and shape of the CHS annual bookmark, 2.5"wide x 8" high. Bookmark class open to all CHS members including Youth members.
- 10. Entries will be judged on:
  - a. Horticultural value 40%
  - b. Photographic value 40%
  - c. General appeal 20%
- 11. Each Image should be identified on the reverse with: class number, class title, name of the exhibitor, exhibitor's member number. *Note: Identification should* be in same orientation as photograph is to be viewed. Please do not use a flower show entry tag.






